The grand jury charges:

## Count 1

On or about April 10, 2006, within the Southern District of California, defendant CHIA KIA CHENG, aka Ronald "KC" Chia, knowingly and willfully attempted to export from the United States to the Republic of Indonesia a defense article, that is, an M4 Carbine fully-automatic rifle, which is designated as a defense article on the United States Munitions List, without having first obtained from the Department of State a license for such export or written authorization for such export, and committed an overt act that was a substantial step toward committing the offense, including: flew from Singapore to the United States; asked the person supplying the rifle to "express" the rifle's shipment to Indonesia; wrote an address in Indonesia on an International Air Waybill; and paid cash for the costs of the

rifle and shipping to the Republic of Indonesia; all in violation of Title 22, United States Code, Sections 2778(b)(2) and 2778(c), and Title 22, Code of Federal Regulations, Sections 121.1, 123.1, and 127.1(a)(1).

## Count 2

On or about April 10, 2006, within the Southern District of California, defendant CHIA KIA CHENG, aka Ronald "KC" Chia, knowingly and willfully attempted to export from the United States to the Republic of Indonesia a defense article, that is, an M4 Commando fully-automatic rifle, which is designated as a defense article on the United States Munitions List, without having first obtained from the Department of State a license for such export or written authorization for such export, and committed an overt act that was a substantial step toward committing the offense, including: flew from Singapore to the United States; asked the person supplying the rifle to "express" the rifle's shipment to Indonesia; wrote an address in Indonesia on an International Air Waybill; and paid cash for the costs of the rifle and shipping to the Republic of Indonesia; all in violation of Title 22, United States Code, Sections 2778(b)(2) and 2778(c), and Title 22, Code of Federal Regulations, Sections 121.1, 123.1, and 127.1(a)(1).
